TF the oarsmen of a crew are not in perfect balance, working as one unit - the shell will wobble, and move forward with but a fraction of its proper speed. Just so with radio. If the units of a receiving set are not in perfect balance, distortion of tone and lack of selectivity and distance are the inevitable results.
